Unfinished Stories – Participatory Art Installation

In an age of global media monopolies, social media, algorithm curated news, confirmation bias, media echo chambers, distraction, and post-truth, Unfinished Stories seeks to unpack the production of news, and is designed to challenge our understanding of what being informed means. Partnering with *Ming Pao Daily News*, and *Discourse Media*, Unfinished Stories invites participants to select from a daily menu of headlines and political cartoons, piecing together the content of their own personalized newspaper, which is then printed on site.

Media Democracy Day strives not only to know and change the media, but *to be the media* by working with local media makers to share messages and forms of expression that intervene in cultural and political life. Presenters:

Angela Sterritt is an award-winning journalist and writer from British Columbia. She is Gitxsan and belongs to the Gitanmaax band. Sterritt has worked as a journalist for close to twenty years. Her reports have appeared in the *Globe and Mail*, *The National*, CBC's *The Current*, and various other national and local news programs. She currently works with CBC Vancouver as television, radio and online reporter, producer and host. Her CBC column "Reconcile This" launched in September.

Darin Barney is the Grierson Chair in Communication Studies at McGill University. He is the author and editor of several scholarly works, including *Prometheus Wired: The Hope for Democracy in the Age of Network Technology* and, most recently, the co-edited volume *The Participatory Condition in the Digital Age*. Barney's current research focuses on materialist approaches to media and communication, infrastructure and radical politics.

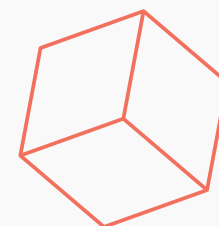

Roundtable #3: Rebuilding Sustainable Media: How do we rebuild a sustainable media sector in the era of unreliable funding and an erosion of public trust?

The traditional, ad-focused model for media funding has been under strain for decades, but in the past five years of community papers folding, newsroom cuts and buy-outs, it has become acutely obvious that we need to rethink how our industry is supported. This roundtable explores examples of successful, original funding platforms—both in the media industry and beyond.

Community (or municipal) broadband is a public alternative to the privately-owned Internet services sold by Bell, Rogers, Telus, and other Internet service providers. Because it is not market-driven, community broadband can help bridge the “digital divide” by providing cheaper and more accessible Internet access to those who experience barriers to getting connected. This roundtable will explore what community broadband is, why it matters now and how communities across Canada can take their digital future into their own hands.
